<p style="text-align: center;">Chronic Disease Management Family Practice Nurse</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Education and counselling on chronic diseases • Follow up of routine lab work • Assess medication and lifestyle changes • Connect with community resources 	<p style="text-align: center;">Preventative Care Family Practice Nurse</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ASaP screening through opportunistic and outreach screening • Physical assessments • Provide requisitions for routine screening • Follow up of screening results
<p style="text-align: center;">Geriatric Family Practice Nurse</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Assessments within the context of geriatric care • Liaison between family and/or facility • Assess interventions and medication changes • Palliative care 	<p style="text-align: center;">Diabetes Educator Family Practice Nurse</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Assessments including foot checks • Refer and follow up on routine screening exams (eye exams, bloodwork, etc.) • Insulin titration and monitoring • General education and counselling
